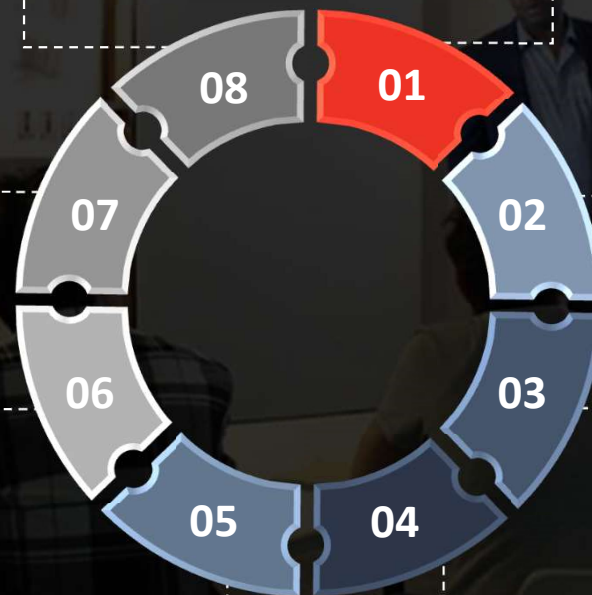

Reason #6 The Passive Voice

What to Repair

1. The passive voice is formed by using a form of the auxiliary verb "be" (be, am, is, are, was, were, being, been) followed by the past participle of the main verb.
2. We make the passive by putting the verb 'to be' into whatever tense we need and then adding the past participle. For regular verbs, we make the past participle by adding 'ed' to the infinitive.

Forming the Passive Voice:

Tense	Active	Passive
present simple	I make a cake.	A cake is made (by me).
present continuous	I am making a cake.	A cake is being made (by me).
past simple	I made a cake.	A cake was made (by me).
past continuous	I was making a cake.	A cake was being made (by me).
present perfect	I have made a cake.	A cake has been made (by me).
pres. perf. continuous	I have been making a cake.	A cake has been being made (by me).
past perfect	I had made a cake.	A cake had been made (by me).
future simple	I will make a cake.	A cake will be made (by me).
future perfect	I will have made a cake.	A cake will have been made (by me).



Writing Weakness: The Passive Voice

What to Repair

1. The reason why students lose points is that they have no reason for using the passive voice, which reveals a lack of understanding of the rules.
2. The passive voice is normally used in scientific writing, and not normally in essays.

Reasons to Use the Passive Voice:

1. **Emphasis is on what happened, not who did it.**
*Obama **was voted** the first black president.*
2. **You don't know who did the action**
*Fire **was invented** a very long time ago – even before I **was born**.*
3. **Who does it is unimportant**
*Smoking **is not allowed**.*
4. **To stay/appear objective, scientific, technical or logical.**
*Her clothes **were soaked**, suitcase **was broken** and her neck, **severed**.*
5. **To appear diplomatic – especially when a mistake has been made.**
*An error **has been made** and we plan to right that wrong.*
6. **When we want to change the focus of the sentence:**
The Mona Lisa was painted by Leonardo Da Vinci. (We are more interested in the painting than the artist in this sentence)



Writing Better: Changing the Passive to Active Voice

Change the Passive Voice to the Active Voice:

Active - Passive

1. Writing sentences in passive voice can obscure the subject of the sentence and confuse the reader.
2. In general, the active voice makes your writing stronger, more direct, and, you guessed it, more active.
3. When I ask students: Why are you using the passive voice, 90% cannot explain or have no idea why they are using the passive voice, which is why I advise remaining in the active voice unless you consciously intend to use the passive voice for one of the reasons.

Correcting Passive to Active Voice

Active is Best!

1. In general, the active voice makes your writing stronger, more direct, concise and, you guessed it, more active.

Change the Passive Voice to the Active Voice:

1. More than five hundred children were evacuated from the town by the firefighters and volunteers.

Revised: **The firefighters and volunteers evacuated more than five hundred children.**

2. It is believed by the teachers that students should be required to pass in order to go to the next grade.

Revised: **The teachers believe students should pass the test to go to the next grade.**

3. The ball was kicked by Chester.

Revised: **Chester kicked the ball.**

4. The money has been stolen by the criminals.

Revised: **The criminals have stolen the money.**

5. The town was destroyed by fire.

Revised: **A fire destroyed the town.**

What low-level linking?

Low-Level Linking is Bad



- ❑ At the basic level of English, students are taught to put foundational transitions at the start of every sentence.
- ❑ This makes writing very mechanical, but that is often the goal at the basic level.
- ❑ Students often use the same basic placement and words.

Student Response: Low-Level Linking and Over-Linking

Over-Linked and Low-Level:

Pollution signifies one significant combustion engine drawback, demanding its replacement. **First**, fossil-fuel engine vehicles promote environmental contamination through carbon dioxide emissions. **Next**, carbon dioxide emitted impurities advance global warming through heat reflection. **Second**, gasoline-powered engines give birth to nitrogen oxide that discharges airborne toxic brown gas. **Furthermore**, it combines with hydrocarbons to generate befouling ozone.

How do we repair the over-linking/low-level-linking?



What does high-level linking look like?

Increases Cohesion



- ❑ Establishes logical connections between information in a paragraph.
- ❑ They signal the relationship between ideas.
- ❑ Students often use the same basic placement and words.

Student Response: Proper Linking (High Level)

Properly Linked:

Pollution signifies one significant combustion engine drawback, demanding its replacement. **In short**, fossil-fuel engine vehicles promote environmental contamination through carbon dioxide emissions. **By and large, this** carbon dioxide pollutes through a greenhouse effect and acid rain when mixed with air moisture. **Along with** carbon dioxide pollutants, gasoline-powered engines birth nitrogen oxide that discharges airborne toxic brown gas. **This** oxide combines with hydrocarbons to generate befouling ozone. **Notwithstanding these points**, a further pertinent reason exists to exchange petrol-based engines outside of pollution.

Writing Mistake: Bad: Unanswered or Unsupported Claims/Assertions

Unsupported Assertions

- ❑ An unsupported assertion is a statement of fact without any evidence to support that fact. ❓ Avoid them in your essays.
- ❑ Whenever you give an opinion or make a claim about something, make sure that you have answered any obvious questions the reader might have.
- ❑ For every claim you make in your writing, you will be required to **prove** your point. Your opinions and generalizations will need factual detail (evidence) to support them.

*Some people think that **criminal behavior has genetic causes**. Others believe that it is circumstances that lead people to commit a crime. Discuss both views and give your opinion.*

Those who believe strongly in the role of genetics in determining future behavior can point to case examples. It is very common for the children of violent criminals to display some degree of abnormal behavior as children and later in life. In addition, genetic material from parents associated with traits generally low intelligence, poor diet, impulsivity, and hyperactivity can be passed on to children. The above-referenced claims lend support to those favoring genetics as the main cause of criminal conduct.

Directly Answering

- ❑ The most important job when answering an essay question is precisely that: to answer the question.
- ❑ **YOU MUST PRESENT A CLEAR POSITION. PRESENTING A CLEAR POSITION LEADS TO HAVING CLEAR PROGRESSION.**
- ❑ Note: You do not use the conclusion to present whether you think the advantages outweigh the advantages. You never introduce new ideas or an unstated position in a conclusion.

Despite the seemingly persuasive arguments above, **one cannot wholly agree with this position** because **the computer can't subsume teachers' roles completely**. Although this machine represents the most cutting-edge tool in the world, numerous tasks exist that computers **cannot perform as excellently as a teacher**. More specifically, computers excel at objective matters such as grammar and vocabulary but fail miserably in style, voice, and perspective, **so teachers will not disappear**. Identified Weakness: Lack of Proofreading

Why Proofread

- ❑ *The more grammar and lexical mistakes you have the lower your score drops.*
- ❑ *The lower the level of Grammar and Lexical usage, the lower the score.*
- ❑ *One of the biggest mistakes students make is failing to proofread (improve their work).*

What to look for when Proofreading:

1. Your identified typical weaknesses (verb tenses, Articles Prepositions, Commas, Spelling, Word order).
2. Weak (low-level) vocabulary
3. Repeated Language
4. Sentence Variety
5. Eliminating Weak Verbs (Accuracy)
6. Check Relevancy, Organization, and Coherence

Note: You need TIME to proofread, which means practicing completing an essay with 5 minutes to spare.

Identified Weakness: Lack of Proofreading

Why Proofread

Mistakes are made for three main reasons:

- You will make some mistakes simply because you were writing quickly.
- You will make some mistakes because of uncertainty.
- You will make mistakes due to foundational weaknesses.

How to stop making the same mistakes:

1. Proofread (Self, then Grammarly Premium)
2. If using Grammarly, do not allow it to correct the mistakes for you.
3. Once you have identified the mistakes, go back and re-write that sentence(s) on your own.
4. Use Grammarly and go back and check if the correction was made.
5. Study and master the mistake area.
